## PARLIAMENTARY PANEL SURVEY - MPs - SEPTEMBER 2010

Q1: Under current extradition law, a UK citizen or resident can be sent to another country to face trial, including EU member states, the USA, Russia, Azerbaijan, Israel and Australia. Extradition laws were amended in 2003 in order to speed up proceedings. Under current law, a UK court cannot stop extradition even where the actions surrounding the alleged crime took place while the person was in the UK (for example, in the case of Gary McKinnon).
