Loyalists

Those that voted for Labour both in 2019 under Jeremy Corbyn and in 2024 under Keir Starmer 2

Joiners

Those that did not vote for Labour in 2019
(including those not old enough to vote), but did in 2024

3

Defectors

Those that voted for Labour in 2019, but did not in 2024 (including those that did not turn out)

4


Considerers

Those that did not vote for Labour in 2019 or 2024, but did strongly consider them at the last election


How do our segments identify with party and policy?

A third of defectors still say they consider themselves Labour




How do our segments rate Labour's start in government?

...but more than a third of their voters think they're doing worse than expected




What do our segments think of Keir Starmer and other high-profile Labour figures?


How vulnerable are Labour now to losing voters that stuck with the party through two wildly different leaders?




One in five Loyalists say their vote was 'against' another party, rather than 'for' Labour, at the 2024 general election




One in five Loyalists are 'very open' to voting for a political party that isn't Labour

Their focus on environmental and social benefits align with my own views




How likely are the voters Labour gained from other parties to stick around?



There is nothing Labour can do, they are far away from my views on climate change





Three quarters of Considerers were more motivated to vote 'for' another party than 'against' Labour



Voted Conservative

Voted Liberal Democrat

Focus more on young people's needs as we are the generation who will have to live with the consequences

Move away from their right-wing policies and prioritising the upper class and return to appealing towards the working class and working towards a better future for them

Remarkable victory

Labour's election-winning voter coalition is remarkable in its diversity, which was a strength in July but may prove challenging in the future

04

Disillusioned Defectors

Being more left-wing or liberal may win some of these over, but that is unlikely to help in Con-Lab marginals, and may lead to stockpiling votes that decrease electoral efficiency 02

Wavering Loyalists

While a majority are happy, Labour should be concerned a significant minority of those that found Corbyn *and* Starmer palatable show signs of wavering already

05

Cautious Considerers

Small in number, Labour must be wondering what it needs to do to win these over. A competent and gaffe-free first term, after 14 years away, may sway these fickle voters

03

Unreliable Joiners

If the Tories get their act together, Labour will lose some joiners. This is beyond their own control, but alienating Lib Dems via policy decisions, is not

06

Sunak parallels

Johnson & Truss lost voters to the Tories' left, and Sunak lost them to the Tories' right: Starmer now faces serious threats from both sides of the political spectrum
